

Introduction

The UK is Europe's second largest games market after Germany and the fifth largest in the world with London at its heart. Alongside the strong consumer market in the UK, London has a growing ecosystem of talent and investment, and so provides a highly attractive proposition for B2B and consumer events.

Esports has become a professional sector with competitions and tournaments welcoming players and teams from all over the world. London is becoming a recognised destination for high profile esports events, having welcomed the 2018 FACEIT London CSGO major, ESC finals, FIFA eWorld Cup finals, PES finals and CWL London to name just a few.

Both games and esports, collectively the fastest growing entertainment media sectors in the UK, work closely with the Virtual Reality and Augmented Reality (AR&VR) community; another thriving London ecosystem

London infrastructure developments

Big venues in the pipeline include a new London arena for resident Overwatch team London Spitfire. Also Madison Square Garden Company are in the process of securing planning permission to open the Sphere in Stratford

Larger tournaments are beginning to flock to London. In 2019, players from around the world returned to London to compete at FIFA eWorld Cup Championship

London has just announced a Call of Duty franchise – so future teams and further competitions likely to attract additional visitors to London

LONDON GAMING AND ESPORTS FACTS

Some of the world's biggest worldwide successes – Monument Valley, Candy Crush Saga, the Batman Arkham series have all been made in London

614 games developers and publishers are based in London – 28% of the overall UK industry. These include EA, Sega, Nintendo, Konami, Pokemon, King, Capcom and Rocksteady

23% of the country's 255 video game degree courses are held in London

65,000 people

attended Games London 2018, playing 400 games and arranging £20m in deals during the event

Fnatic, a London based esports company, has recently raised \$40m funding to grow their team portfolio and international fanbase. This likely to lead to more competitions and teams here in London as well as attract more visiting fans.

There are a number of venues dedicated to esports such as the Gfinity arena and Red Bulls Gaming Sphere in Shoreditch - the UK's largest public esports studio. In addition, Twickenham Stadium is now home to Excel Esports and team; League of Legends

The National Film and Television school and Royal Holloway, university of London awarded £10m to set up the StoryFutures Academy – a new school for storytelling in VR and AR

Staffordshire University's London Digital Institute recently opened at HereEast in London – this will be the first academic institution in London offering esports degrees.
